
Marvin Metzger



Veterans Day History



World War I ended on June 28th, 1919, when the Treaty of Versailles was signed, even though the fighting ceased seven months prior. A temporary ceasefire, called an armistice, went into effect between the Allied nations and Germany on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month, marking November 11th, 1918 as the end of “the war to end all wars”.

President Wilson was the first to bring national recognition to this day when he proclaimed November 11th the first commemoration of Armistice Day on November 1919. It wasn't until May 13, 1938 that November 11th of each year was actually made a legal holiday. It was known then as “Armistice Day”. After World War II, the 83th Congress decided to amend the act so that American veterans of all wars may be honored on that day. And so, on June 1, 1954, November 11th officially became Veterans Day. A day we honor our American veterans for the bravery, patriotism, and heroism it takes to selflessly sacrifice their time, and sometimes their lives, for the greater good.

So on this Veterans Day, make sure you thank a person who has served in our Military. Whether it's a family member, friend, or stranger on the street, give them your appreciation for their service. It's one small gesture that would mean the world to the people who fought for our country!
