My Life – by Gladys Rowe James

I was born in the beautiful Teton Basin, in the town of Tetonia. We lived in a log cabin at the time. Later we moved into my maternal Grandfather's home. He was a widower and needed help caring for the house and his small dairy. My father and his brothers were carpenters, which meant my father was away most of the time. Probably a good thing as he and my Grandfather didn't see eye-to-eye. Grandpa believed everyone needed to work, so there was little time for play. He worked hard caring for cows, horses, sheep, and pigs. My sisters and I had to care for the chickens, carry the milk buckets, carry wood, and help where needed. It was good training and we learned good work habits and the need to care for animals.

In 1922, the contractors Dad worked for bid on building schools in Los Angeles area and asked Dad move there and be their construction foreman. Going from a “one horse” town, where we had only seen a “tin-lizzy” (Model-T), to L.A. was an eye-opener for us kids. Mom had to keep us on a short leash. We were used to talking with everyone, but you don't do that in LA. As soon as Dad finished one job we would move to another, which meant changing schools for my sisters and I. In the five years we lived there we changed schools ten times. It was really hard and so different from the one room school we attended in Idaho. Around 1925, T&D Enterprises started building theaters for the “talkies.” The first one Dad worked on was the Sunset Theater on Sunset Avenue in Los



Angeles. The summer of 1927 Dad was sent to Oroville where the State Theater was to be built. My family arrived there in July and stayed for a week in a little auto court where the Nature Center is now. My poor mother, with five kids and no air conditioning. This was our last move. Dad worked on the theaters in Chico, Marysville, and Red Bluff and commuted back and forth. By then, my oldest sister and I were in high school and had many good friends. We didn't want to move. So, Mom stayed in Oroville and Dad traveled.

My freshman year, 1929, is when the Great Depression hit our family. Dad was out of work, and Mom helped by doing housework. My sisters and I took any work we could after school and on the holidays. Dad got some chickens and planted a big garden. He was able to pick up odd work now and then. We never felt we were poor, as everyone was in the same boat.

I graduated from Oroville High in 1933. Our class was the first class to graduate at the State Theater, and there was over one hundred of us. The summer was spent doing odd jobs, which made me realize more training was necessary to get a job I really liked. A good friend offered to loan me the money to go to Heald Business College in Sacramento. Another good friend found a home in Sacramento where I was offered a room for helping care for the children. I stayed in school for a year until another of my wonderful friends sent word that there was to be an opening in the Butte County Assessor's Office. I rushed home and applied for and got the job. After a year, I was offered a bookkeeping



position in the County Auditor's Office. As book-keeping was what I wanted, I took the job at \$105 a month. In those days, we worked five-and-a-half days.

In 1935, I met the love of my life, Harold James. We were married in Reno in September of 1939. I still hadn't cleared all of my school debts and was afraid of losing my job, as at that time working married women were frowned upon. When asked, my boss assured me my job was safe. We left Reno and went on to San Francisco, places I'd never seen. Our week in S.F. was wonderful. The World's Fair was open on Treasure Island, an island built especially for the Fair and the Golden Gate had just been completed. So much to see!

Harold and I built our home on Canyon Highlands a year after our marriage and lived there for forty-five years. When the second World War started, Harold knew he would be drafted so he enlisted in the Navy. In June of 1943, he was stationed at Hilo, Hawaii, in charge of the post office at the Hilo Air Base. I never saw him again until he returned to San Francisco three years later.

As I was living alone, as so many wives were, a girl, one of my co-workers and the first friend I made when we moved to Oroville, Florence Scott, came to live with me. We really threw ourselves into the war effort. Besides raising some chickens and a victory garden, we would rush home after work, eat dinner, and rush over to the cannery where we worked from six until midnight. Not that we needed the money, but the cannery was in need of help.

When Harold returned to the States, he was stationed in Seattle, Washington, at the Bremerton Naval Station. I left my job at the Auditor's Office and joined him in Seattle. I wanted to take our car, but gas was a problem. I got enough gas stamps from friends to fill the gas tank and Don Turner, a gas station owner, got a barrel full of gas to put in the trunk and I took off. Love my friends! Somewhere in the woods of Oregon, I found a little dirt road and some trees to hide the car while I siphoned gas from the barrel to the tank. AH!! What a mouthful of gas I got. I made the trip in one day.

I was working on a Remington bookkeeping machine at the Auditor's Office, so the Remington Co. in Sacramento gave me a good recommendation to their office in Seattle. I went to their office and they found a job for me the next day. Harold was released from the Navy two days before Thanksgiving of 1945, and we returned to Oroville.

Harold returned to his work at the local post office, but as we wanted to start a family, I didn't take a steady job until our daughter started school. Mr. Jay Partridge, County Superintendent of Schools, asked me if I would come to work in his office, which I did. November 1, 1957, Harold was made postmaster of the Oroville Post Office. I was envious of him getting to attend meetings around the state and leaving me home. At that time, I was Mr. Partridge's Chief Deputy and it wasn't always easy to get away. In 1965, I took a job in the Oroville Union High School Office and worked there until I retired.

Harold loved hunting and fishing, so when he retired in 1969 we decided to find a cooler place to live where there was good fishing and hunting. We sold our home and moved to North Bend, Oregon, just across the bridge from Coos Bay. What a great place to live. We made lots of good friends and were able to travel in our motor home from Alaska to Southern Mexico. Harold didn't like flying, but I was able to visit New Zealand, Australia, China, Scandinavia, Israel, and Thailand. In 1994, we felt age was creeping up on us and we needed to come back to our family in Oroville. Oroville has always been home to us.

When my family came to Oroville in 1927, my school friends went to the Methodist Church, so I joined them. Mother was a Baptist and had always taken us there, but I wanted to be with my friends. The minister's wife was such a great lady, she was our teacher and was forever thinking of things for us to do. There were twelve in the class. We formed a secret club, TLB Club, and had a little ceremony that we did each week. She had teas for us and taught good manners. Most of us had never seen good china and nice napkins. Such a great Christian lady. We still remember her when we are together. In 1954, Harold and I joined the Church. When in Oregon we had our membership transferred. That was a smaller membership, but hard working folks. When we returned, we transferred back. The Church has been an important part of our lives.
