GRAMMER'S COFFEE CAKE

David Dewey

¼ C	sugar	¼ C	flour
2/3 cube	butter--softened	1 C	boiling water
¾ C	canned milk + ¼ C water	1 lge or 2 sm	eggs
2 pkg	dry yeast	2 tsp	salt
as needed	flour	½ cube	buttermilk
1 C	brown sugar	2/3 C	flour
2/3 cube	butter-softened		
8" or 9"	cake or pie pans		

Mix together the sugar, ¼ C flour and 2/3 cube of butter. Pour boiling water over this and stir. Then stir in the 1 C mixture of canned milk and water. The mixture should now be lukewarm, not hotter. In ¼ C of warm water gently stir in yeast. Beat egg (or eggs) and add to mixture. Cover and keep warm. When it is "fluffy" add salt and flour until quite stiff. Cover and let rise. Punch down and let rise again (time varies depending on mood, moon phase, and ???). Put in greased pans, about ½ full. Be gentle with it! Melt ½ cube of butter and add an equal amount of milk. Mix and spread on top of dough. Let rise, and prepare the topping

For TOPPING, mix brown sugar, 2/3 C flour and 2/3 C butter together to make crumbly. If too sticky, add more flour. Spread on top of dough after it has risen. Bake at 350° for 20 minutes, or until golden brown on top. Best served warm, especially on cool mornings with coffee or hot chocolate.

SERVING: This coffee cake was traditionally served with coffee or hot chocolate--it's dippin' good! Grammers sliced it into strips, so we kids would try to be in position to be passed the cake when the longest, middle piece, was next to be taken! YUM!

NOTE: These recipes are from my Grandmother Dewey, affectionately called "Grammer" by the entire family (a name given her by her first grandchild, my cousin, Helen). Grammer used a lot of "recycled" things, like bacon grease for greasing the pans, and measured most everything by a "touch" of this, a "pinch" of that and "tad bit of these." So I followed her around and measured what she was doing (as best I could) the results were deemed "just like Grammer's" so you can now enjoy some of her specialties. Some of her recipes are simplifications of more complex traditional recipes so she could serve them in her cafe back in the mid 1930s.

IRISH BEER BREAD

Alma Short

3 C	self rising flour	3 Tbsp	sugar
12 oz	beer	¼lb	butter, divided

Preheat oven to 350°. Mix everything except butter and place in a 9" x 5" greased loaf pan. Melt butter and pour 4 Tbsp over the top of dough. Bake 20 minutes and then pour the rest of the butter over the top of the dough. Continue to bake for 40 more minutes. Remove from oven and set on a wire rack to cool.

Men who built monuments:

Retired Oroville ironworkers talk tools of the trade

Oroville >> When it comes to talking about building bridges, tunnels and tall buildings, Stu Shaner and Rick Hook can finish each others' sentences. Part of their story is that they worked side-by-side as members of the same ironworkers' union, constructing monumental buildings throughout Northern California.

A few of the countless projects include the Auburn-Foresthill bridge and a similar bridge on Highway 70 near Oroville. The men worked on several projects on Oroville Dam and Hook was on the crew that built the Sundial Bridge in Redding.

In the 1980s the men also worked on a two-mile tunnel that was part of the Wyandotte. Another job was reinforcement of the

Shaner considered Hook a young "punk," when he joined the business of building. By the time Hook joined the team, Shaner had been banging steel beams for more than a decade.

Both are retirees now, but they joined forces again Saturday to speak at Bolt's Antique Tool Museum in Oroville. Speakers appear each third Saturday of the month as part of a special series at the museum.

Hook and Shaner demonstrated several of the tools of the trade for an ironworker, including "beaters" used in combination with a "bag full of bolts."

Part of the job was connecting large pieces of iron, usually many stories up in the air and never with a safety net. There were ropes and safety cables available, but this was often dangerous as well. If he was roped into his location, he "could get squished" if tons of iron suddenly came his way, he said.

The men were quite burly back in the day, and Shaner said they also took a beating.

Shaner recalled working on a bridge in Oroville. A bar of steel was 60-feet long, about 1 1/8 inches around and weighed 320 pounds. At the time, they would think nothing of carrying the bar with just two men.

"That's why this shoulder is shorter than this one," Shaner said, his body showing a slight shift to one side.

“I was 5 feet, 8 inches when I started. Everyone shrinks over time, but iron will shrink you more.”

Shaner recalled that he had attended classes at Yuba College to learn forestry, but he wanted to “do something daring.”

Ironwork was dangerous. Shaner said he had many close calls. Hook nodded in agreement. In fact, Shaner’s nickname was cat with nine lives, Hook said.

The term “go in the hole,” or “fall in the hole” refers to falling from a building. A mistake could end with an ironworker buried in a hole in the ground.

Hook remembers one close call vividly. The men often rolled up their cuffs at the bottom of their work pants. Shaner “fell in the hole,” but by some miracle his pant cuff caught on a small outcropping of metal, and managed to break Shaner’s fall. He had been headed for a 28-foot fall landing on his head. But after catching on his cuff he was able to fall at a different angle.

Shaner recalled another feline moment, when he fell eight stories while working in Calaveras County. That time, Shaner recalled, he felt quite certain it was the end.

The work was not easy on Shaner’s wife, he said. At least one time he came home with stitches, but he came home.

The men told other colorful stories showing tools they had used in the trade. Some examples were heavy mallets and long rivets. The rivets were literally heated on the job. Next they were tossed to a catcher, then handed off to the man who would place the rivet in the hole in the beam.

Since then the industry has shifted toward a shorter, high-strength bolt, Hook demonstrated.

There were times when it was so hot on the job that workers made a point not to wipe away sweat. Their clothes might be covered with salt at the end of the day, but wetness on their skin allowed a little cooling, Hook explained.

More metal objects

For those who have not visited Bolt’s Antique Tool Museum, it’s at 1650 Broderick Street and the hours are 10 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. seven days a week. For information, 538-2528.

The displays are many and include collections of tools for farming, concrete work, upholstery, carpentry, railroads, medicine, and more.

Additional talks are scheduled at 10 a.m. the third Saturday of each month. Cost is \$3 and includes admission to the museum, which is the largest hand tool museum in the world, with more than 12,000 pieces.
